These include deafness, blindness, and deaf-blindness along with a variety of academic challenges. Each student's individual sensory needs are considered a vital part of their program. Their classes include self-help, functional academics, daily living skills, pre-vocational and vocational workshop skills, recreation, and physical education. In all of these areas, communication and language development is emphasized. The students are encouraged to achieve their fullest potential.

RESIDENTIAL and DAY PROGRAMS: Whether a student is in the day or the residential program, their classes are similar. Day students arrive in the morning and leave in the afternoon on a school bus for home. With the residential living program, dormitory placement is an option for WVSDB students. The residential living program is designed to complement the classroom instruction. There are age appropriate after-school activities and opportunities to use skills learned in the classroom.
